Summary of Society Activities

Like all organizations, 2020 presented many challenges for the NBSA. We began the year with a plan to launch a new event in support of the North Bay Food Bank, but we soon learned the impact that Covid-19 would have on our organization, community, and our daily lives.

After debating how the NBSA might push forward with action items for the year, our membership decided it best to pause meetings and planned activities since our members primary focus was, understandably, navigating their businesses through this challenging time.

We did, however, continue to support the Dionne Quints Heritage Board – a local non-profit responsible for the historic Dionne Quintuplets birth home – with landscaping suggestions and concepts for future interpretive panels to describe the story of the Dionne girls.

Our society was also pleased to once again receive special purpose funding from the OAA this year. A summary of the application and use of funds is outlined on the next page as part of the Special Project Funding Report.

Special Project Funding Report

Following the success of our society's first-ever NBSA Scholarship process in 2019, we were excited to once again pursue Special Project funding to support this great initiative. The scholarships were created to support high school students within our society boundary who would be pursuing a career in architecture. One scholarship valued at \$1000 is awarded to a student pursuing a degree in architecture, while a second valued at \$500 is awarded to a student pursuing a diploma in architectural technology.

The members of our society worked together to develop the framework, eligibility criteria, and evaluation system for the scholarships. We issued the scholarship documents to every high school within our society boundary, and posted information on our website, and also issued a media release which garnered some coverage.

Three applications were received for the scholarships, and the recipients of the awards were as follows:

The North Bay Society of Architects (NBSA) has announced that it is offering \$1,500 in scholarships for students in North Bay and the surrounding area.

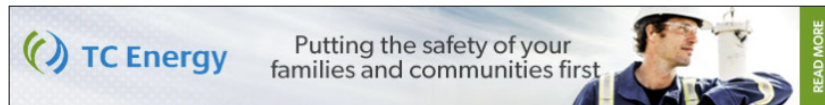
The society's scholarship program, which was initiated in 2019, consists of two scholarships for prospective post-secondary architecture students. The first scholarship is valued at \$1,000 and is designated for one student pursuing a university degree in architecture. The second scholarship is worth \$500 and will be dispersed to a student pursuing a college diploma in an architectural field, such as architectural technology or interior design.

In 2020 NOSA continued to focus on engagement and promotion of our local society initiatives. It was not quite as an eventful year for NOSA due to the Pandemic, social distancing and the cancellation of the Special Funding requests. At the beginning of the year, we were able to organize, host a few architectural advocacy events. Below is a summary of our NOSA's activities for 2020.

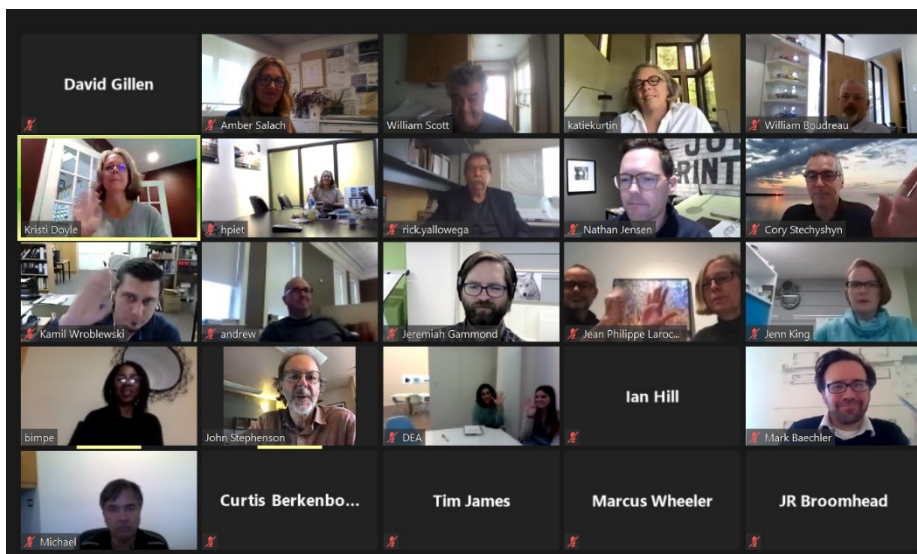

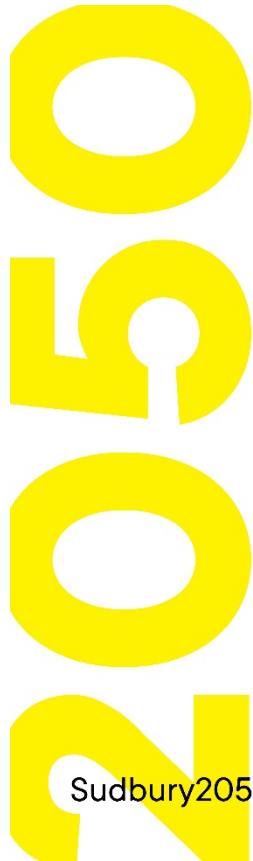
Sudbury 2050 Urban Design Competition

Niagara Society of Architects Report: Events and Activities - 2020

The year 2020 was rather different than other years due to the limitations on in-person events.

Meetings:

An in-person meeting was held on February 27 (Heather Sakai of Guardian Glass), with subsequent planned meetings being cancelled.

Discussions were held from time-to-time with two of the usual meeting places (The St.Catharines Club and the Dalhousie Yacht Club), and although, through much of the year arrangements could be made, they would be difficult, so it was decided to defer in-person meetings.

In July an on-line architectural quiz night was held, with a variety of questions about architecture and construction.

In the previous OAA Continuing Education cycle the NSoA conducted a 'Get Your ConEd Hours Day', which was a Friday before cycle end which was packed with material for those who were short of hours, and those who wanted some to carry forward. As this was not possible, four on-line 'Zoom' sessions were set up.

These included:

November 19: OAA president's talk

November 26: with Durock on wall systems

December 15: with Tom Miller a British architect, who spoke on 'The Modest House' and conducted a fascinating discussion with the NSoA attendees. Unusually for the NSoA, this was held at noon, because of the time differences between the UK and Niagara. This was a very successful venture, and opened the door for more international content that can be developed in the future.

December 17: with Tremco on roofing materials and approaches

Films:

Although the 2020 Architecture+Design film series had to be cancelled, it was decided to develop the planned film trailers to be shown at the St.Catharines Performing Arts Centre before the films, both those belonging to the series, as well as before other selected films. Discussions were held in 2019/early 2020 with possible film producers and Lauren Emberson was selected on the basis of her understanding of architecture, viewing of other pieces of her work, as well as her competitive price. Through the summer a sub-committee worked with Ms.Emberson to develop four short film trailers featuring the architecture of Niagara and the involvement of Niagara architects in its creation. These will be used when the film series resumes and is not being hosted on the NSoA website, as well as being used at other events, such as the Cultural Days part of the Grape and Wine Festival (cancelled in 2020), when it resumes. The work was completed in late 2020.

Scholarships:

The scholarship programme was run again, and six applications were received. The quality of the applications was excellent and the committee decided to give two awards in 2020, one to a Waterloo student, and one to a Carleton student. It was decided to award two scholarships in

future years, provided that suitable applications are received. Based on the success of the talk given by a previous recipient, the scholarship now includes the obligation of the student to deliver a talk about their educational experience and their project work, to a NSoA meeting at a future convenient time.

Construction Liaison Project

Participation in joint Niagara 'Public Procurement for Local Prosperity Project' with the Niagara area contractors and other consultants continued in the first months of the year. Activities were suspended through much of 2020, and will resume in 2021 when it is possible. The NSoA worked to increase relations with the Niagara-area contractors, in promoting the industry, including NSoA representation at some of their meetings, and in the sponsorship of an 'Ice Dogs' hockey game, unfortunately cancelled due to the virus.

Walking Tour Project:

In conjunction with the proposed 2021 OAA conference to be held in Niagara Falls, the NSoA received Special Projects Funding to create an architectural walking tour of Niagara Falls. Although the conference was cancelled, the project continues, being undertaken by a sub-committee. The project was initially seen to be a paper guide to be included in the conference package, as well as put in the tourist racks at hotels, restaurants and the information centres, however now it is seen as being primarily in electronic form - accessible on the NSoA website and ultimately on a phone-accessible app. There is considerable general historical material available, but it does not have an architectural focus. Elements of this are being developed and as they reach a somewhat-complete form are being posted on the NSoA website.

Media Coverage:

The NSoA continued with obtaining media coverage. The executive ensured that the death of Don Chapman at the age of 94 was well covered in the media - a third of a page on page two of the main newspapers. Don Chapman was known for his many years as one of the main architects in Niagara Falls. The awarding of the scholarships was also covered in the major regional newspapers, complete with a photograph of one of the students being presented with her cheque.

Northwestern Ontario Society of Architects – 2020 Year in Review

We are pleased to provide our 2020 overview of activities and undertakings for the Northwestern Ontario Society of Architect, including our year-end accounting.

2020 had proven to be a year of new challenges and change due to the COVID-19 pandemic which affected us world-wide shortly after our first Society Meeting held February 13th of 2020. The pandemic changed the way we do business and the way in which we go about our daily lives.

Following the provincial shut-down and ongoing impact that COVID placed on society, NWOSA carried out two additional society meetings virtually using the ZOOM platform and maintained regular correspondence through email, providing members with valuable information and insight related to the changes and ongoing measures that impact our profession.

With the COVID pandemic having such a wide-spread effect on society, it led our membership to evaluate how our local society of architects could make an impact in our community that would demonstrate our commitment to recognizing the effect that the pandemic is having on our community and the various not-for-profit organizations in need of additional funds to support the challenges being felt within the community. For this we chose to provide a **\$2,000.00** sponsorship toward the **Thunder Bay United Way's COVID-19 Community Relief Fund** campaign, providing financial support to local not-for-profit organizations such as;

- Dew Drop Inn
- Shelter House
- Regional Food Distribution Association
- Our Kids Count
- Northwestern Ontario Women's Centre

As local Chair, I have participated in several virtual OAA Society Chair meetings this year, encouraging conversation amongst the various societies throughout the province. These meetings are continuing into 2021 and provide the opportunity to share thoughts, ideas and continue to discuss issues and challenges impacting the profession.

Our local members also participated in this year's OAA President Virtual Tour, which for the first time brought together several northern Ontario societies into one meeting to share thoughts and ideas that are common between our communities and the members. Our members were very receptive and responsive to the meeting and conversation that took place and look forward to continuing with the tradition.

2021 will continue to bring new challenges and adjustments and NWOSA will be carrying out its local society meetings using virtual meetings utilizing the ZOOM online conferencing platform.

The page following provides an overview of our 2020 financial information, with two past OAA Special Funds remaining in reserve due to challenges we are facing in the COVID-19 pandemic in carrying out the events they were intended to be utilized for. We continue to discuss and explore alternative options for completing the Special Events and this will be the first topic for discussion for the local society members in the coming year.

A message from the 2020/21 ORSA Executive

COVID-19 was a blow to everyone this past year and ORSA, like so many other societies and volunteer organizations, has tried to step up to the challenge with a renewed sense of purpose, a call to action rather than a reason to wallow.

When the pandemic first hit everything, including all events ORSA usually offers, came to a halt. The AGM came late in the summer and the entire executive had decided to step back which left a void and no-one to carry the organization forward. In this void, a new team stepped forward presenting a new strategic plan with which to garnish new support with the hopes of a valuable energy the society had seemed to be losing as the year waned and the isolation of the pandemic lengthened.

By the time of the OAA President's visit in mid-November ORSA had a new Executive with a big job ahead, to bring a society back from the brink of abandonment and irrelevancy. What was a surprise was to hear that there were many architecture societies across the province that were facing similar challenges amplified by the state of existing brought on during the current health crisis.

Armed with a new strategic plan the Executive has already begun to make strides towards its goals of improved communication with its membership and providing an outline of objectives for its membership to get involved with. A short form outline of this strategic plan is included in this report.

A web developer has already been engaged and we expect the new site to be launched by the end of Q1 2021 to align with the first online version of Ottawa Architecture Week. Our social media is slowly growing traction with 15% of our first year goals and plans are underway to reach out to local firms and schools of architecture and technology to raise awareness to re-connect with our membership and spread the word about how people can get involved in our local architecture community.

ORSA is committed to becoming a more relevant and focused society of engaged members and interested audience through which we promote the values of our profession in our community. ORSA volunteers, including the executive, board members and the leaders who organize our events (such as Ottawa Architecture Week, Women of Architecture, the Official Plan Committee and the Golf Tournament) are who make this organization function and make it great. We are looking forward to a year of new growth and youthful energy through which to inspire our membership to get more involved and reconnect with each other and their community. As can be seen in the financial report, ORSA is well positioned for an exciting year of revitalization, so hold on, it will be an exciting ride.

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A message from the 2020 TSA Executive

It is probably an understatement to say that 2020 has been a year like no other.

For the last 133 years, the TSA has been bringing people together to discuss, learn and explore around our shared passion for the built environment and love for our city. With gathering restrictions, physical distancing and stay at home orders in place, this year's pandemic brought new challenges that jeopardized the very core of what we do.

With 2020 now behind us — and thanks to the work of our tireless volunteers and staff — we are proud to say our Society rose to the occasion, finding new ways of building community and bringing people together all while staying apart. Through virtual platforms and new digital programming, thousands of people were able to join us on virtual tours, online lectures and digital meet-ups. From virtual Pride floats to gingerbread cities, our members displayed their creativity in new virtual spaces and our programming has become more accessible and inclusive, engaging new audiences and welcoming new members far beyond our traditional reach.

The success of these new digital offerings has made it clear that they are here to stay — a permanent compliment to our popular in-person events which we hope to restart in the near future. We are still in the early days of our digital programming, but we are looking forward to

implementing the lessons learnt from 2020 and exploring these new opportunities for engagement.

While the pandemic and our pivot to digital took the lion's share of attention and resources, 2020 was also important for our Society's governance as we continued to work behind-the-scenes in making the TSA more transparent, accessible and sustainable. Key to these goals was the development and implementation of our new Initiative Co-Lead training process, a new one-year leadership training opportunity required for all those seeking to be part of the Executive. This approach forms part of our long-term succession plan and helps to ensure the members of the Executive are invested in both specific initiatives and the big picture vision. Work is currently underway to produce a volunteer handbook that defines all key volunteer positions and establishes clear paths for leadership positions.

Speaking of leadership, 2020 was also a year of leadership renewal at the TSA, as we elected a new Chair (Megan Torza) and Vice Chair (Ana-Francisca de la Mora) for the 2020-2022 term. We want to take this opportunity to thank Past Chair Maria Denegri for her leadership and dedication, and look forward to her continued support and advice.


While the year was certainly unique, some things remained (thankfully) unchanged. In terms of membership, it was yet another year of continuous growth as we welcomed just over 249 new members, a 15% increase compared to the previous year, for a total of 1885 members. This increase was throughout all membership categories, although new student members still represent the fastest growing membership category. We are incredibly grateful to our membership for their continued support and commitment to the TSA.

Unfortunately, not everything in 2020 is a story of growth. The cancellation of the TSA BASH, our annual year-end fundraiser and party, coupled with the financial uncertainty of a difficult year meant that 2020 also marked our lowest fundraising and ticket sales in recent history. While our income shrank by approximately 20% compared to 2019, thanks to careful financial management and reduced event costs, we were able to deliver high quality, timely and abundant programming throughout the year and continued our commitment to scholarship programs within the GTA.

The financial sustainability of our Society will be a continued area of focus as we transition to a new year-round sponsorship program and look to balance the return of our in-person programming with our new digital offerings.

2020 was nothing if not challenging and this year's annual report provides a snapshot of what is likely one of the most peculiar years in our Society's history. We are immensely proud of what we have accomplished as a Society and are excited to build upon this work as we enter a new year.

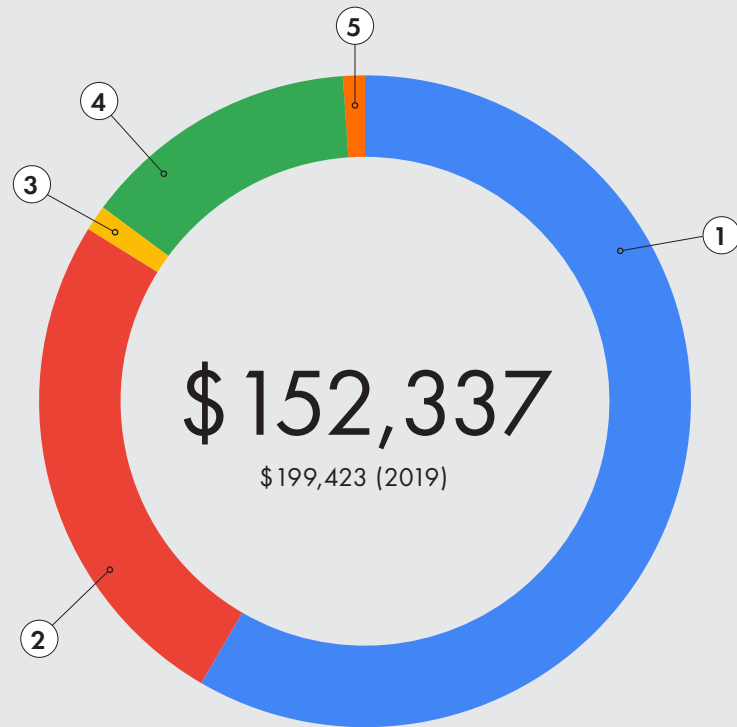

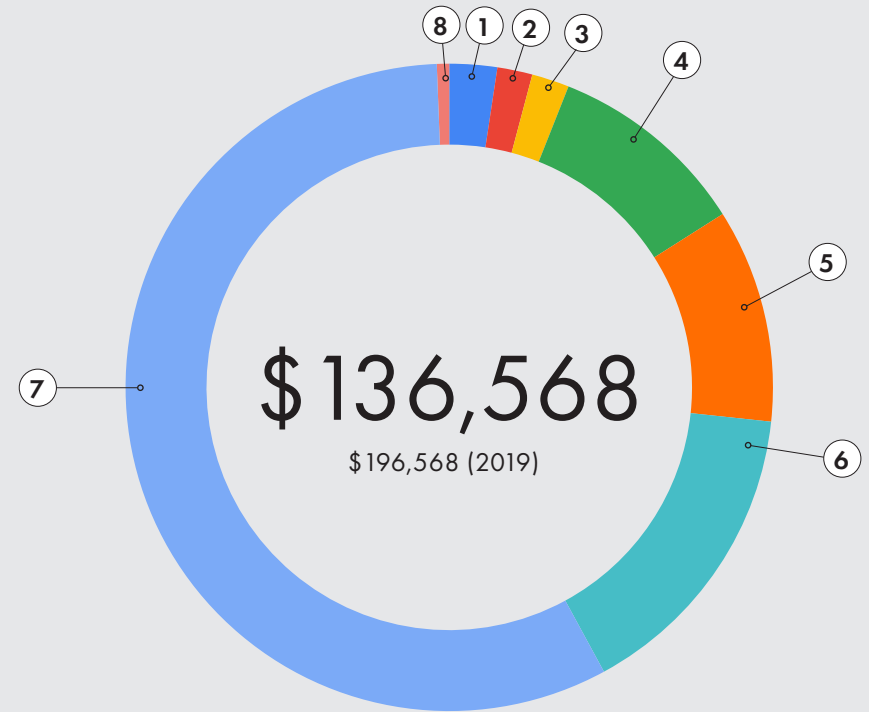

2020 Annual Report

The WRSa is proud of their efforts this year in continuing to engage members and the community, especially given the challenging year. We played an important role in our community, providing outreach, community involvement and support, and, once again, important commentary into continued architectural issues facing our community. We have once again been successful in expanding on our three primary mandates of outreach, activism, and awareness.

Our outreach this year began by contributing to the Windsor-Essex United Way's COVID-19 Community Response and Recovery Fund, which went to help support those in the community who already face barriers such as poverty, homelessness, and social isolation – issues that were further affected by this global pandemic. We



garnered the support of various member firms and were able to collectively contribute monetarily to the endeavour. Later in the year, we continued our support of the United Way's efforts by contributing to their 'On Track To Success' program which is a career-building initiative that helps kids graduate high school and go on to post-secondary education. This program currently includes several architecture students. Other outreach included supporting various events held by the local construction association.



Our community awareness this year was highlighted primarily by our continued support of the Windsor International Film Festival (WIFF), thanks to the OAA's Special Project Funding received in January 2020. With Covid-19, WIFF was a very different event this year, and became a summer drive-in movie event 'WIFF Under The Stars', held downtown along Windsor's riverfront. Support of this festival was held only for the areas most prominent donors, for which we are proud that the WRSa was included in on, given our long-standing relationship with WIFF's executive director. We are proud to have been able to participate in such a positive event in the core of the city.





Our support of the Our Lady of Assumption Church, founded in 1728 and the oldest parish in Canada, West of Montreal, continued this year by working with church representatives to organize an event in 2021 related to the church, the site, its heritage and its indigenous ties. This event is in the planning stages for execution in Fall 2021 as part of Doors Open Windsor, and as funded by the OAA's 2nd round of Special Project Funding, so preparation work is ongoing.

This year also brought discussions with the City of Windsor and the Windsor Construction Association, in relation to the development of a new vendor relationship management policy. We also continued our support of a responsible site for Windsor-Essex's new Mega Hospital by providing a written submission to the Mayor and City Council before voting whether to support its construction at the selected rural ex-urban site.

In the interest of promoting awareness of the field of architecture, this year we founded a new Education Subcommittee, and have begun to develop a prioritized outline of initiatives for this subcommittee with a variety of interest groups and audiences, including primary and secondary school children, post-secondary, interns, and continuing education for working professionals. We are proud of this initiative, and look forward to developing it further in the coming year.

We have also added a Vice-Chair to our Executive Committee, Aaron Ashley, who is a Licensed Technologist with the OAA bringing benefit to the society as we navigate the continuing evolution and diversification of our members and their designations.
